# **Things you Should do to Ensure Clean Drinking Water if an Emergency Strikes**

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as established many guidelines for people to utilize in case there is a crisis situation where your water service got interrupted. Unfortunately, even though the agency gives sound, life-saving advice, a lot of people don't bother to take some time to read and assimilate the material. Therefore, if a disaster strikes, and power services are out of commission in order that residents can't get onto their computers to get the information they need, they may be lost. Although we all think a disaster could never takes place, we need to recognize that we must be prepared for the "what ifs" life throws at us.

So what would you do in case a tornado struck, damaging your dwelling, disrupting your utilities, and you finally realized it could be days before you have access to some assistance? One of the first needs you'd run into is that of clean, fresh water. Following a disaster, local water sources, such as ponds, lakes, and rivers can not be trusted. Who knows what might have blown into that water, and you certainly wouldn't like your family drinking it. Some will probably be fortunate enough to possess a supply of bottled water readily available. If this type of supply wasn't contaminated by the storm, it'll meet your immediate needs.

You should recognize that if there is a disaster, you will see a run on any supermarkets that is still standing, and there will not be enough bottled water to go around. That's why it's good to plan ahead and keep some stored at home, preferably at the lower level within the area you would go to if there was a storm warning. In addition , you need to keep in mind that although boiling water makes it safe, when the utilities are disrupted, you won't have any way to boil the water. Aside from having a [portable water filtration system](#), pre-planning to cover something which may never happen is by far the most effective choice.

Something the EPA does explain to you is that in times of disaster, you need to discover what the [water filtration companies](#) are saying and water supplies. They might be able to give you more relevant information related to your own particular situation. As an example, there could be a well you're unaware of but which you can access to acquire the water you'll need. Therefore, it's a good idea to have a battery-operated radio within the area of your lower level where you will go to enable you to get any emergency information which might be broadcast.
